

Background biography (May 2007)

Denysé is a native of Atlantic Canada, born in the country's Easternmost province, Newfoundland, and raised in Nova Scotia.

A lifelong dreamer, she began writing at an early age and can't recall a time when she wasn't creating in some artistic form. An active interest in the American West, and to a lesser extent the American Civil War, has been a lifelong obsession. Cowboys have been a loveaffair that began at the tender age of three, and eventually expanded to encom-

pass an equally timeless passion for pirates, Greek Gods, and Ancient Egypt. The other side of the Old West intrigue is an affinity for Victorian England, particularly the 1885-1895 part of the century.

Denysé's first major fantasy novel is *AS FATE DECREES*. The novel relies heavily on Greek Mythology, and is set in Ancient Greece and modern Athens. If you enjoy a tale of Gods, Destiny, and the battles of an Eternal Champion, this is the book for you! Not surprisingly, there's a touch of romance throughout, of course! "It's what I do best, after all!" The next fantasy novel, already in the works, is about pirates, parallel worlds, and sorcery.

At this point in her career, Denyse has had published in the vicinity of 400 stories and novellas, in almost any genre you can name. "The only thing I haven't tried yet is hard-core science fiction, and horror. Since I don't consider vampires as I write them to be the fodder of horror, I classify those stories as Dark Fantasy." Many of her vampire stories have appeared in Margaret L. Carter's anthology, *The Vampire's Crypt*, and *Night To Dawn*, published and edited by Dawn Callahan for the first two years, and now published by author/editor Barbara A. Custer.

Denysé's poetry has been published internationally, as well. She has also been the recipient of numerous awards, most notably the Fan Quality Award, which is given annually for excellence in fan-written fictions based on film and television. As of May 2004, there are four awards in her collection, and no less than a dozen nominations to her credit.

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BACK GROUND

Also in 2004, Denysé was chosen as a winner in the Amber Heat Wave, an annual contest held by ePublishing company *Amber Quill Press*. One of the novellas published by AQP, *Mirage*, was included in the anthology collection "Suits, Ties, and the Water Cooler", which was a finalist for the 2006 EPPIE Award, a prestigious award given for excellence in electronic publishing.

In 2006, Denysé formed a partnership with actor/ producer/singer Branscombe Richmond to create and write a serial that is best described as a modern day western. (Think motorcycles in place of horses!) Installments of the book have begun appearing on the *American Motorcycle Company* website, (www.amc1902.com) the first episode appeared in April 2006. The serial is available for free, and can found at the company's Home Page. A new project with Mr. Richmond will be officially announced shortly. It is a second serial story, this one a romance novel posted in chapters, will be featured on the website of *Good Morning, Hawaii*. (www.goodmorninghawaiitv.com)

Simply The Best was the title of Denysé's first fulllength erotic romance novel, and was her debut title with Liquid Silver Books (www.LSBooks.com). Upcoming projects include a new Historical/Western romance, an adventure/ fantasy, and possibly a sequel to As Fate Decrees in the near future. In the erotic romance genre there is also lots to explore, including the Victorian mystery series set in and around the infamous Ripper murders; and soon a set of tales that take place at a Venetian Masquerade Ball; as well as many other stories set in a variety of genres.

Denysé also writes an erotic serial for the FREE eZine, *Wicked Escapes*, published bi-monthly. The series is called *Stranded*!, and is comprised of six stories, with all available installments on the website. (www.wickedescapesezine.com)

The short Action/Thriller *Silent Death* marks Denysé's debut with *New Concepts Publishing*, (www.newconceptspublishing.com) a new contemporary vampire thriller with *Forbidden Publications*, (www.forbiddenpublications.com) and new titles in future with *Samhain Publishing* (www.samhainpublishing.com) are also on the books for the coming months. Also, new publisher *Twilight Fantasies* (www.twilightfantasies.com) will feature a new contemporary romance in their anthology *Summer Flings*, coming in August of 2007, as well. The collection was an invitation only project and the story is based on the music of Italian superstar Patrizio Buanne. (www.patriziobuanne.com)

"Would it have made a difference?"


She considered his words, then shrugged.

"Iphicles?"


He smiled. "We will talk later, I promise." He held out his hand and was silent as they walked into the castle.

"Give the scroll to the King," he pleaded.


"The King?"

Time-spanning fantasy will satisfy romantics

It's outlandish, over the top and beyond imagination, but hey, it's a fantasy novel. Whaddya expect?

As Fate Decrees by Denyse Bridger is a rip-roaring yarn that keeps you reading right to the end.

Ares, the war god, purchases Aramantha, a beautiful slave from Greek times, and trains her to be a great fighter. She becomes Champion to the Gods of Olympus, which means she has to serve and vanquish all enemies until the gods grant her peace.

As you might expect, there's little peace for Aramantha. Violence sickens her but this woman can

slice and dice the crap out of entire armies. She is constantly running into people who are just too anxious to fight. To makes things worse, old enemies from the past have a nasty habit of being reincarnated thousands of years later, leading to a situation where even the immortals could die. This is no dull history lesson.

"I've always had an active interest in Greek mythology," says Bridger. "I liked the concept of a single individual who would be sent forth over and over, throughout time, to defend the very face of history and keep the truth of the gods a fact so they wouldnÂ?t fade from memory."

I call As Fate Decrees a time-spanning epic, and while that is a simplification, it's fairly accurate as a broad statement. There is a romance backbone to the story, the catalyst that moves it, but it's not the central plot.

The book is divided into two sections, one set in Ancient Greece to tell you who the Champion is and how she's come to be chosen for this destiny. The second

She has won an Amber Heat Wave Award and has been nominated for an EPPIE Award, for excellence in electronic publishing. If you haven't heard of her yet, there may be several reasons.

"I think some of the problem with recognizability is that this book, As Fate Decrees, is the first one to end up on bookshelves here," she says. "My other books, two trade paperbacks for a smaller publishing house, are only available direct from the publisher, or Amazon.com, and many others are only available as electronic downloads, or e-books as they're called."

There's also the matter of genre fiction not being taken as seriously as other forms, despite widespread public appeal. "I do think, though, in all honesty, that the markets for romance and fantasy/science fiction aren't the general mainstream, so they do tend to be overlooked to a large degree. They're labelled as genre markets, and for some reason, no matter how talented the author is, they do appear to be less respected than mainstream writers.

"That's only an opinion, and in no way a reflection of anyone's thoughts on the matter but my own. Nova Scotia is home to a number of successful romance authors that few people seem to have heard of, people like Ellen Ashe, Julianne MacLean, Deborah Hale, although these ladies are recognizable in the romance fields."

Bridger enjoys writing and communicating with her readers too much to let that get in her way. One of the best things about writing is the reading involved to produce it.

"It enabled me to bring a really rich, detailed vision of the mythology to a new audience as well as an old one. The reading I did for this book was

> Am, short for Amarantha, discovers the King of Corinth is her childhood friend lphicles, mortal twin of the demi-god Heracles. She has secretly loved him all her life, but he is now married with a young son. Treachery abounds, and Am helps the king defend his throne. Honor drives her to leave him and return to her jealous master, Ares, God of War.

> The opening scene is a slave market; the setting is Athens in ancient Greece. Amaratha, a beautiful slave, is purchased by a man whose identity is a mystery and who carries her off on a ship to his castle in Thrace. He is eventually revealed to be Ares, the brutal Greek God of War, and he is training her as a fighter to be his Champion. Her destiny, according to Ares, is to serve the gods and vanguish all their foes until the gods grant her peace.

Amarantha's first mission takes her to Corinth, with a message for the king there. The king, Iphicles, turns out to an old love from her earlier life, adding complications. The story involves gory duels, battles, and treachery as Amarantha attempts to do what she feels is her duty. Her master, Ares, keeps her in the dark, only feeding her hints when it suits him. The other gods do not always agree with Ares.

Eventually the story moves to modern day Greece, and Amarantha is reincarnated in the body of Alexandra, a student of Greek history. Alexandra has been trying to stop a madman bent on world-wide destruction of ancient buildings etc., and now Amarantha must take her place. Adding to her complications is Alexandra's live-in boyfriend, Nic.

The softcover book is 272 pages and includes a page of Author's Notes, five pages of material from the publisher listing other books, and three pages about the author. The story is broken down into sections: Prologue, Part One consisting of seven chapters that tell the ancient tale, Part Two with the modern part of the story told in another eight chapters, and an Epilogue. There is one black and white picture inside, a representation of the God, Ares.
